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
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### Introduction


~The US government is manipulating the right to free speech by infiltrating the filmmaking process



# **Government Involvement in Films: Changing the Public's Opinion**

## Legal Tools

~The US government limits the release of certain classified information to lawyers through the state's secrets privilege, established in United States v. Reynolds (1953) ~This gives the executive department power to withhold any documents in their custody from judicial view if they deem it to be in the **public** interest



~Government-supported films "give the viewer a sense of how the world is experienced through a militarized body" (Andreescu) ~Non-government-supported films evoke emotions by exposing the truth ~US v Reynolds allows the US government to lie to the public and spread propaganda
