Human Rights and **Inmate Health**

Protected under the Eighth Amendment of the United States Constitution:

-Right to adequate healthcare to an inmate's serious medical need.

-Right to adequate food, clothing, and shelter. -Right to humane conditions of confinement. **Protected under the 14th Amendment of the United States Constitution:**

-Right to equal treatment and opportunity to care. -Right to informed consent.

-Right to refuse medical care.

-Right to control their own bodies.

-Right to privacy.

Legal Background

International: The United Nations Standard Minimum **Rules for the Treatment of Prisoners (Nelson Mandela Rules**):

-built around a rehabilitation system; broad guidelines - "the period of imprisonment is used to ensure, so far as possible, the reintegration of such persons into society upon release so that they can lead a law-abiding and self-supporting life."

State: New York State's Consolidated Correction Law §140, Article 6 says:

-"Subject to the regulations of the department of health" -"routine medical, dental and mental health services." **Under the New York State Regulations, Chapter 9 Part** 7651 of the Minimum Standards and Regulations for **Management of State Correctional Facilities:** -proper and available as the healthcare available for the

people in the community.

NYS DOCCS: "Medical staff is onsite at all correctional facilities. Incarcerated individuals have access to medical services on a daily basis through each facility's sick call procedure."

Limitations

- I visited Broome County Jail and spoke with many inmates. However, state prisons are a completely different system, and therefore do not have first hand experience at a state prison. - State budget has not been taken into account.

- I have been researching this topic for a short duration of time.
