

# Current Scholarly Conversation:

- Dichotomous approach that leads to exclusion
- Urbanizing of queers most research based in urban areas and coastal regions

# Intersectionality and Discrimination:

- A prejudicial outlook, act, or treatment - treating individuals differently or unequally
- Discrimination is not single-axis
- How different social categorizations create overlapping and independent systems of discrimination and privilege



- Entitled to the same liberties, protections, and powers that all other citizens enjoy
- Shouldn't be treated as second-class citizens
- Recognize the variety of circumstances in the LGBTQ+ community for policies





### **INCREASED VISIBILITY**


Fewer people in rural communities means any difference is more noticeable.



#### KIPPLE EFFECTS


When communities are tightly interwoven, rejection and acceptance in one area of life (such as church) can ripple over into others (such as work or school).





### **FEWER ALTERNATIVES**


In the face of discrimination, the already limited number of rural service providers can be limited even further.




## LESS SUPPORT STRUCTURE

More social and geographic isolation means less ability to find supportive resources, build supportive community, and endure challenges or discrimination.

# Legal Framework:

# **Equal Protection Law of the 5th** and 14th Constitutional Amendments

- Equal Clause extended interpretation prohibits discrimination based on gender, religion, and disability.
- Should also include sexual and gender identity

## Government Neutrality and the 1st Const. Amendment

- Exercising of religion cannot be restricted or demeaned by gov., yet that same exercise may not unduly restrict other persons in protecting their own interests
- Welsh V. United States: should not create a religious exemption without equal regard for those of nonreligious conscious
- If gov. allowed discrimination, it would not be acting neutrally - It would continue facilitating the continued marginalization of the targeted group

# Qualitative Interviews:

- Youth (14-25 y/o)
- Identifies as LGBTQ+ (lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Trans, Queer, etc)
- Lives in a non-urban location in Ky
- Currently 5+ Participants and personal experience
