- 4. Considered factors like discrimination and psychological well-being.


RESULTS

 Many factors, including the economic strengths of the sending countries, relations with the U.S. and discrimination effects cause the vast difference in socio-economic outcomes.




Median Income for Immigrants to the U.S. By Country
